## SIX-TRAIT CONVERSION CHART

Six-trait scoring provides teachers a way to assess writing using traits or domains: ideas. organization, voice, word choice, sentence fluency, and conventions. However, a teacher needs to be cautious with the calculations. Points should <u>not</u> be totaled and converted into percentages. If that model were to be followed, a student receiving average scores on a 6-point scale (three 3's and three 4's) would get 21 out of 36. Mathematically that results in a 58% and does <u>not</u> reflect average writing. Instead a fairer score of 75% has been assigned to 21 points, and the scale moves up and down accordingly. Use the suggested scales below to help you convert six-trait scoring points to percentages.
